Principals' BOE Report for January 2019

Mad City Money

All 8th grade students participated in an event on January 17 sponsored by Northern Federal Credit Union and hosted by Cornell Cooperative titled Mad City Money. The students are provided with paperwork describing their current lifestyle (job, family, salary, etc.) and are instructed to balance a budget with everyday expenses and stay within their means. Staff acted as merchants "selling" cars, homes, baby items, and a variety of other storefronts as students interacted with us purchasing these items. The activity was a full afternoon of fun with many students expressing shock at the prices of everyday items, "Diapers costs that much!" was heard frequently at my table. Staff and students all agreed to continue offering this opportunity each year! Each student left with a certificate for a \$25 deposit into a savings account opened up at Northern Federal.

Regents Exams

During the week of January 22-25, New York State Regents exams were scheduled but Mother Nature had other plans. With a delay Tuesday, an early dismissal Wednesday, and a closure Thursday, our thoughtfully-planned testing schedule was added to the recycling bin. Again, another year for our superhero, Brandi Graham, saving the day by rescheduling substitutes, multiple times, over those days; and we successfully tested 50 students within the timeframe, but not without some challenging moments. Math exam scoring occurred in our building with the other three content areas dispersed to Clifton-Fine, Harrisville, and Hermon-DeKalb for the remaining joint scoring efforts with our neighbors.

Geography Bee

The contestants for this Bee consist of 30 students, 6 per grade level in grades 4-8. Classroom teachers determine contestants in a combination of interest, and if necessary, individual classrooms can hold contests or have students take a test. Typically the Bee consists of conducting four rounds of questions in the preliminary competition. Up to 10 contestants will then move on to the "final round." In the final round of questions, contestants are eliminated after two incorrect responses until there are two "Finalists" who advance to the "Championship." The two finalists are asked to write the answer to three questions. The person that gets the most correct is the winner. There are tiebreaker questions available and previous round questions are allowed to be used until a winner is determined. The winner takes an online qualifying test. The results of the test are sent in March.

This year the Bee was held on January 25 in the auditorium, led by Mrs. Melanie Morgan and questions read by Ms. Shannon DeSellems. After a gruelling 1½ hours, Gabriela Ornelas (7th grade) came in first place, Myles LaPoint (6th grade) took second, and Caleb Robinson (4th grade) was the third place winner!

The winner of the E-K Geography Bee does get their name on a plaque, and there are prizes for the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners. All participants get a certificate and the winners an award at the end-of-the-year awards assembly.

Character Ed/Cougar Club Assembly

The week of January 21 was interestingly disrupted due to a delay, an early dismissal, and a closing due to weather! The fifth PK-6 Character Education/Cougar Club assembly originally scheduled for January 25 was, therefore, rescheduled to February 1. Eagerly on
